GREAT and LITTLE HUCKLOW and GRINDLOW.

GREAT HUCKLOW is a hamlet and township, in Bradwell parish, 2 miles north-east from Tideswell, $4\frac{1}{2}$ north-by-east from Miller's Dale station on the Ambergate and Manchester section of the Midland railway, and 4 south from Hope station, on the Dore and Chinley branch of the Midland railway, in the Western division of the county, hundred of High Peak, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Bakewell. By the Divided Parishes Act, detached parts of Little Hucklow were transferred to Great Hucklow in 1882. Water is obtained at the foot of Camp hill, from a spring which rises on Abney Moor. This was formerly a part of the Duchy of Lancaster manor of High Peak; the inhabitants attend the church at Bradwell. Here is a Unitarian chapel, built in 1796, and a Methodist chapel, built in 1806. The Wake family of Sheffield are lords of the manor. The principal landowners are Mrs. Childers Radford, of Tansley, Matlock, and Mr. Joseph Bagshaw. The acreage is 1,113; rateable value, £1,280; the population in 1891 was 147.

Little Hucklow is a township, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles north from Tideswell and 1 mile north-west from Great Hucklow. The tithes are granted for the vicar of Bradwell.

Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1826. The acreage is 590; rateable value, £650; the population in 1891 was 120.

GRINDLOW is a township, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-east from Tideswell and 5 south from Hope. Benjamin Bagshaw esq. of Sheffield, is the principal landowner. The acreage is 296, tithe free, rateable value, £395; the population in 1891 was 35.

Letters from Sheffield through Eyam, arrive at 11 a.m. & Little Hucklow about 11.15 a.m. by foot messenger, who collects letters from the inhabitants on his way back. Wall Box, Great Hucklow, cleared 3.45 p.m. week days. The nearest money order & telegraph office is at Tideswell, 2 miles distant
